## Bomb raid turned cinema fantasy into harsh reality

An article in last month's Surrey Comet about the devastating German air raid on New Malden on August 16, 1940, at the start of the Battle of Britain, has stirred up memories of that terrible day for a number of readers. Yvonne Matts tells Shirin Aguiar how a trip to the cinema almost ended in tragedy.

Yvonne Matts, 75, of Alric Avenue, New Malden, was watching Wings of Morning with her sister at the Granada Cinema in Kingston on August 16, 1940, when a German bomb fell outside the family home and blasted their mother, Elfif out of the kitchen into the hall.

On discovering the bombing raid after emerging from the cinema, the girls were desperate to get home but with transport disrupted, they managed to get a bus to Kingston Road and then walked along The Cut.

A friend they met told them that their mother had been taken to

hospital.

Miss Matts said: "I was terrified and rooted to the spot. I needed my parents. To think of life without them, it just wasn't possible."

Their mother had been taken to hospital after the blast in which an elderly woman across the road died from her injuries.

Miss Matts said: "We were lucky. My mother spent, the night in Kingston hospital.

"She was only suffering from shock. People were groaning.

"For a month afterwards she was taking bits of glasses from her skin." \* Lewdoup
